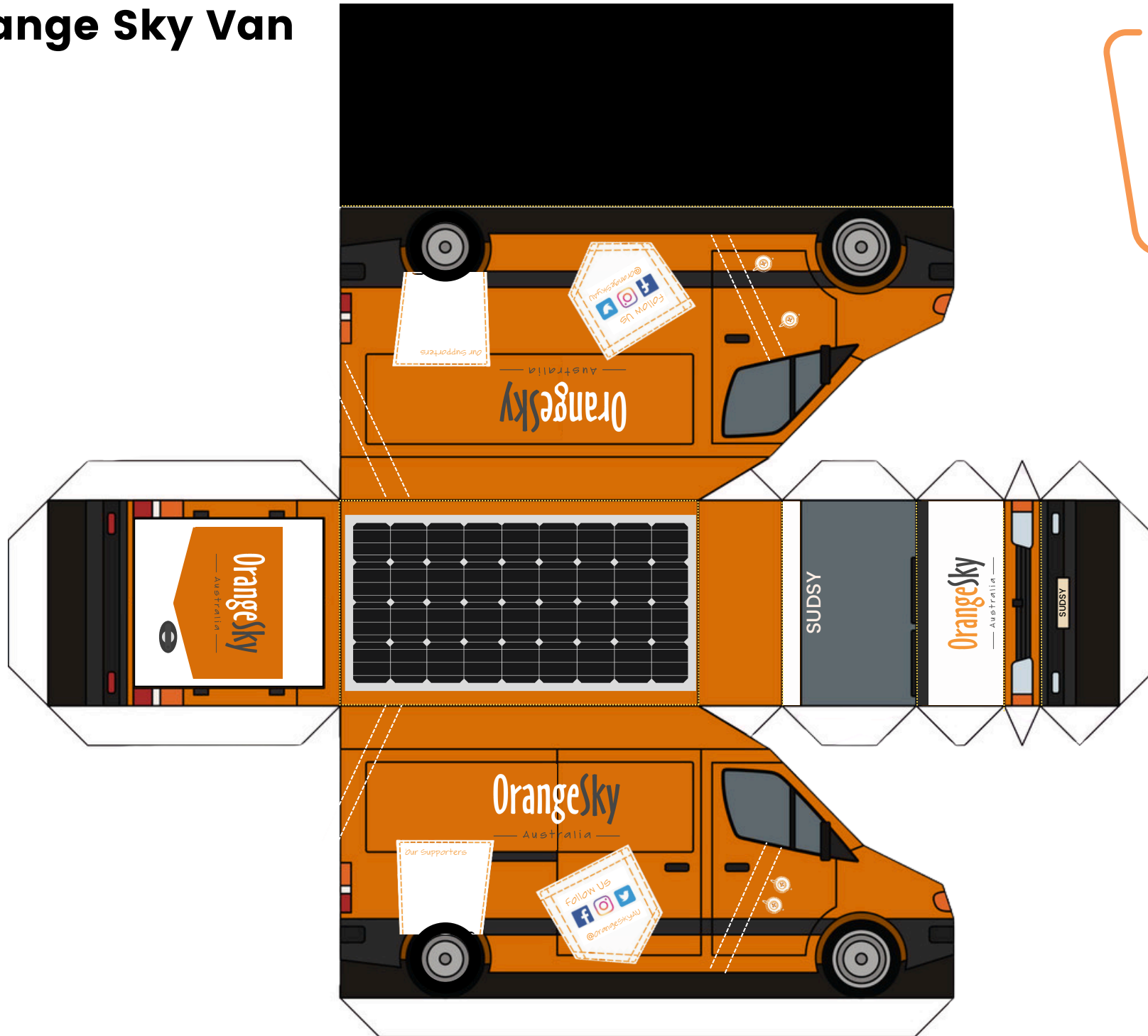
What you'll need

- A3 or A4 White Paper (*For best results, we recommend paper that is 200gsm, so the models are sturdier*)
- Access to a colour printer
- Scissors
- Glue Stick

What next?

1. Download this PDF to your computer
2. Select the page/s you'd like to print
3. Print page/s
4. Cut out around the outside of the images (be careful not to cut off the white tabs, you'll need these for sticking the models together!)
5. Fold carefully along the indicated lines yellow dotted lines
6. Fold down white tabs
7. Add a little glue to each tab and slowly stick together to create a 3D model
8. Leave glue to dry

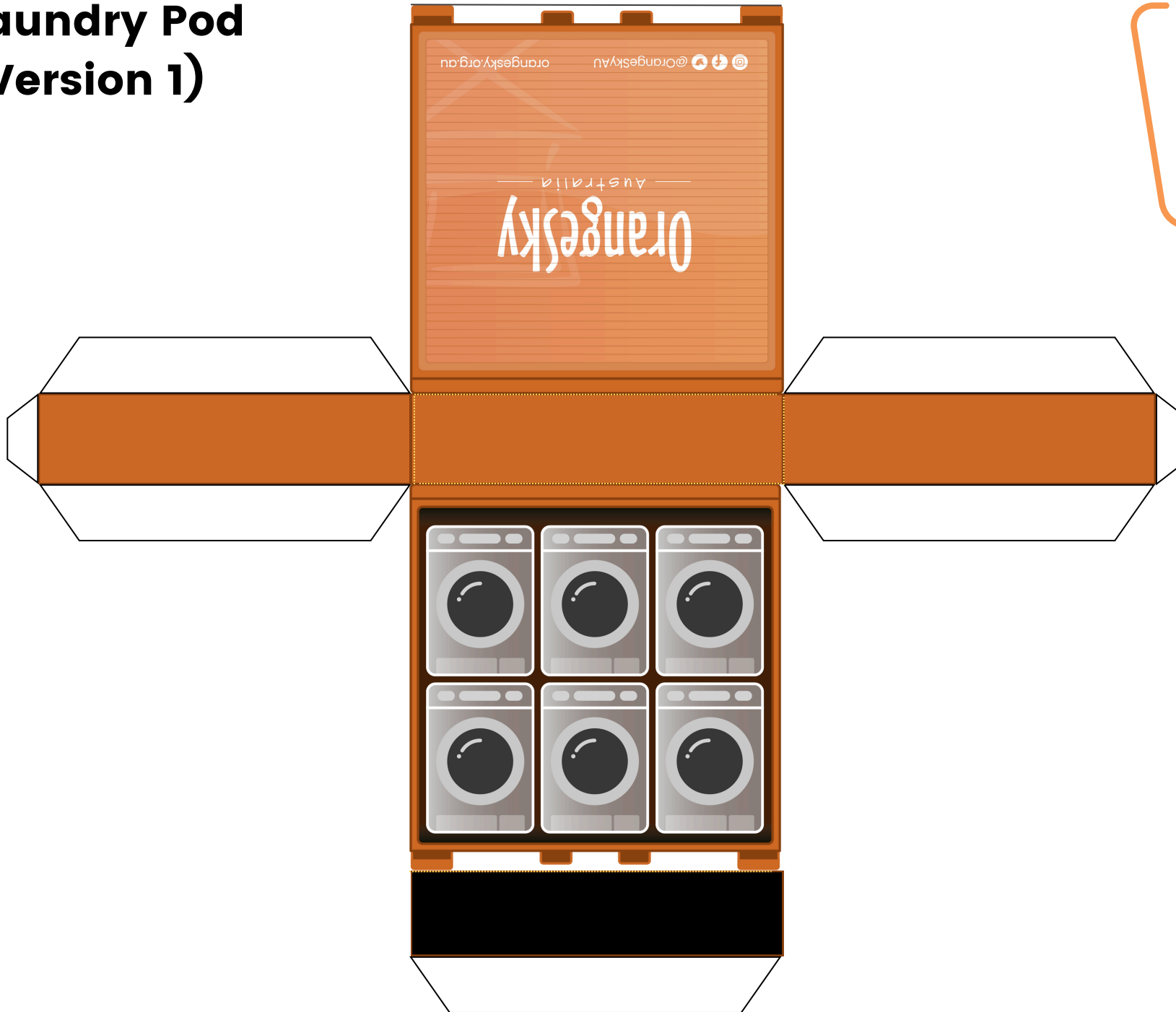
Orange Sky Van

Orange Sky Laundry Pod (Version 1)



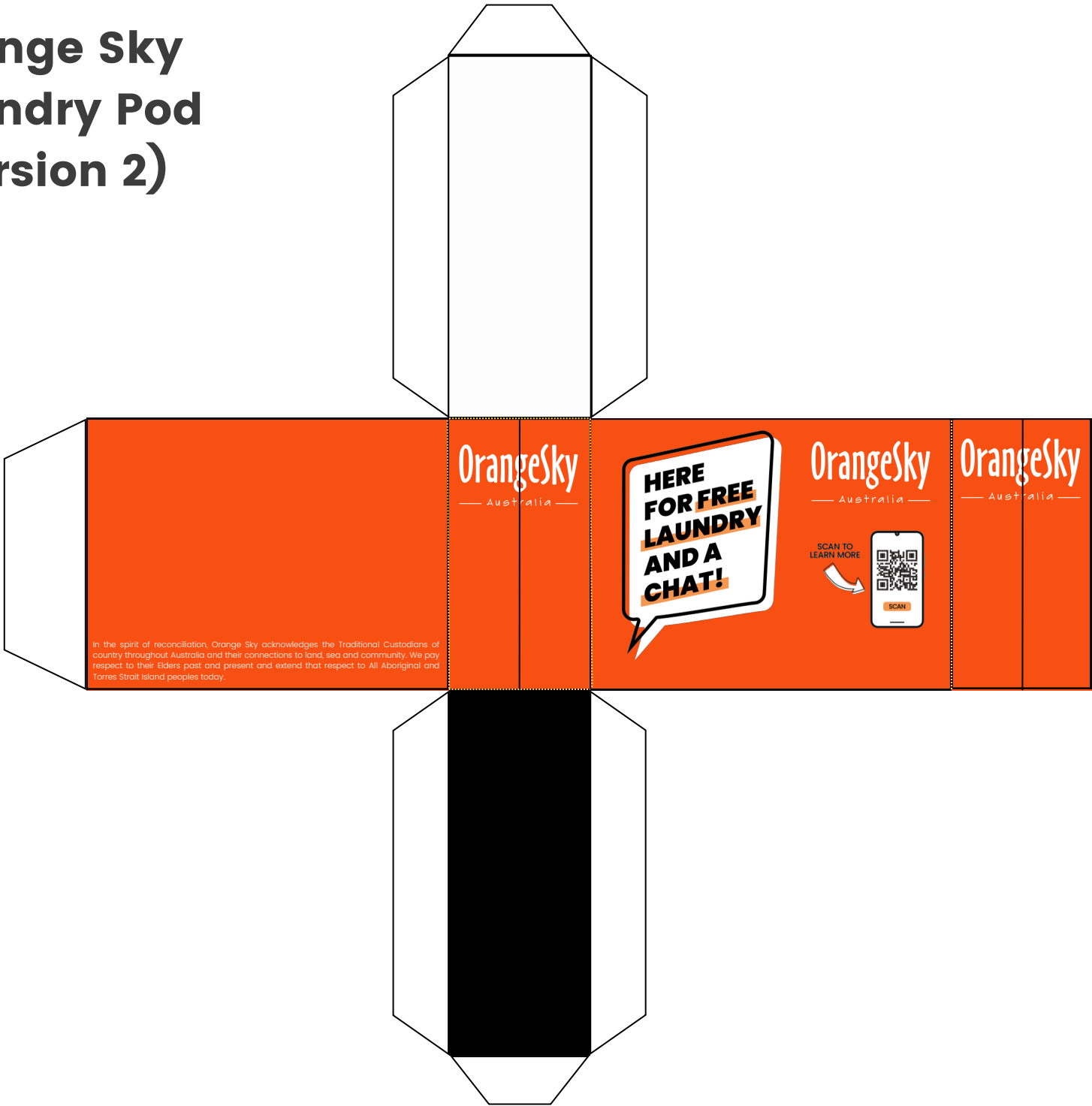

Orange Sky Laundry Pod (Version 2)

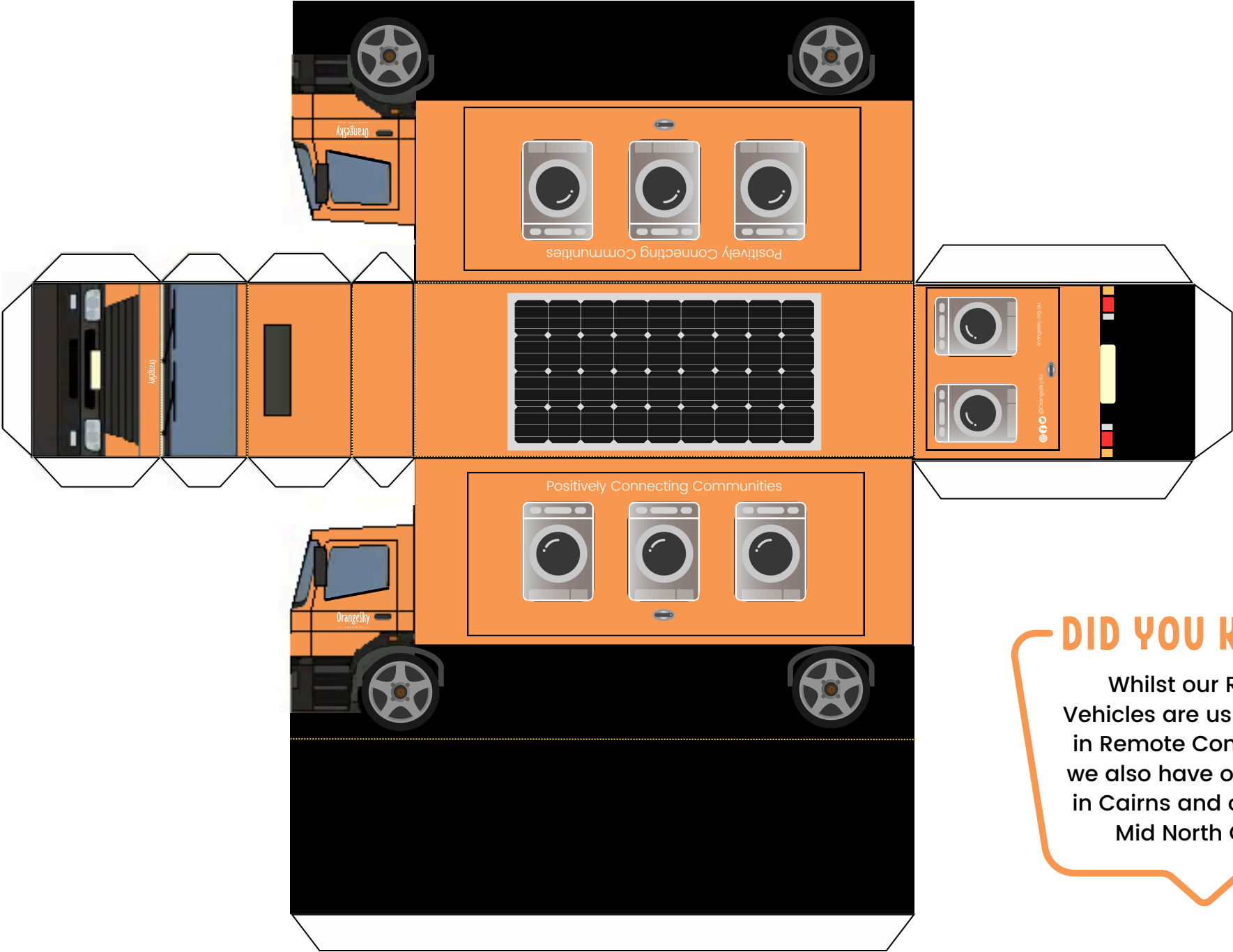

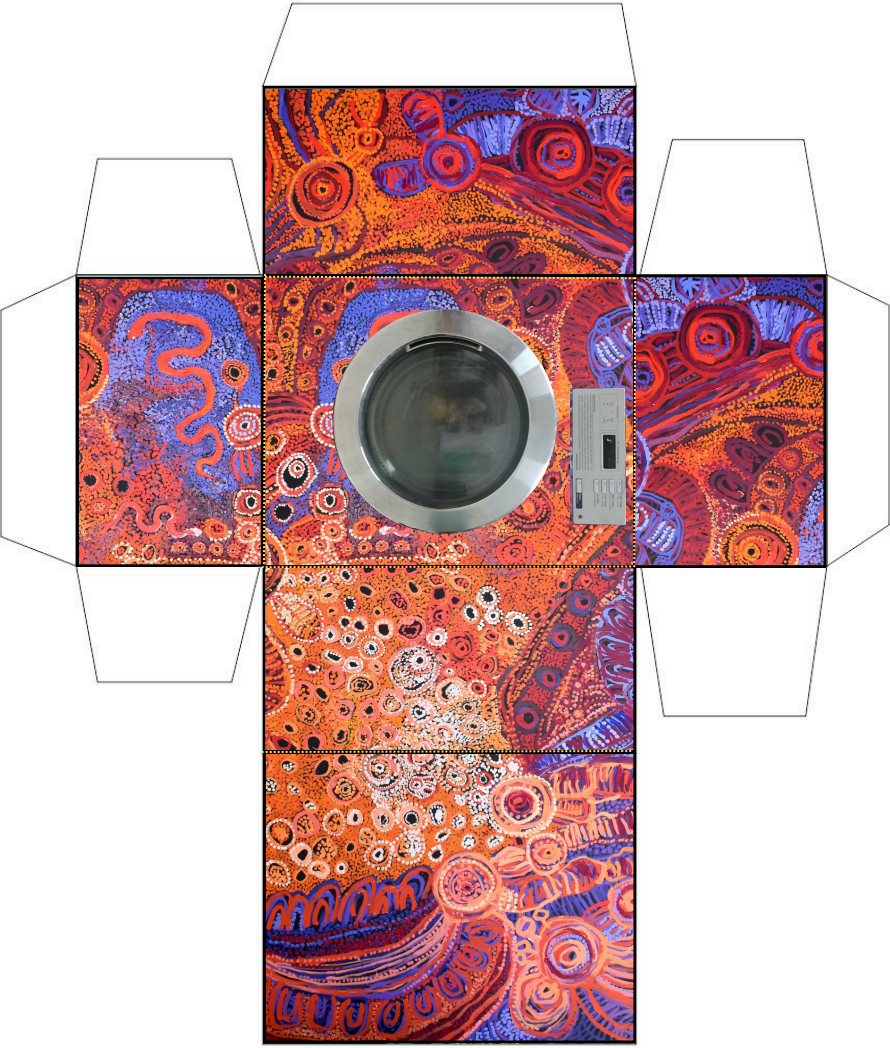
Orange Sky Remote Vehicle



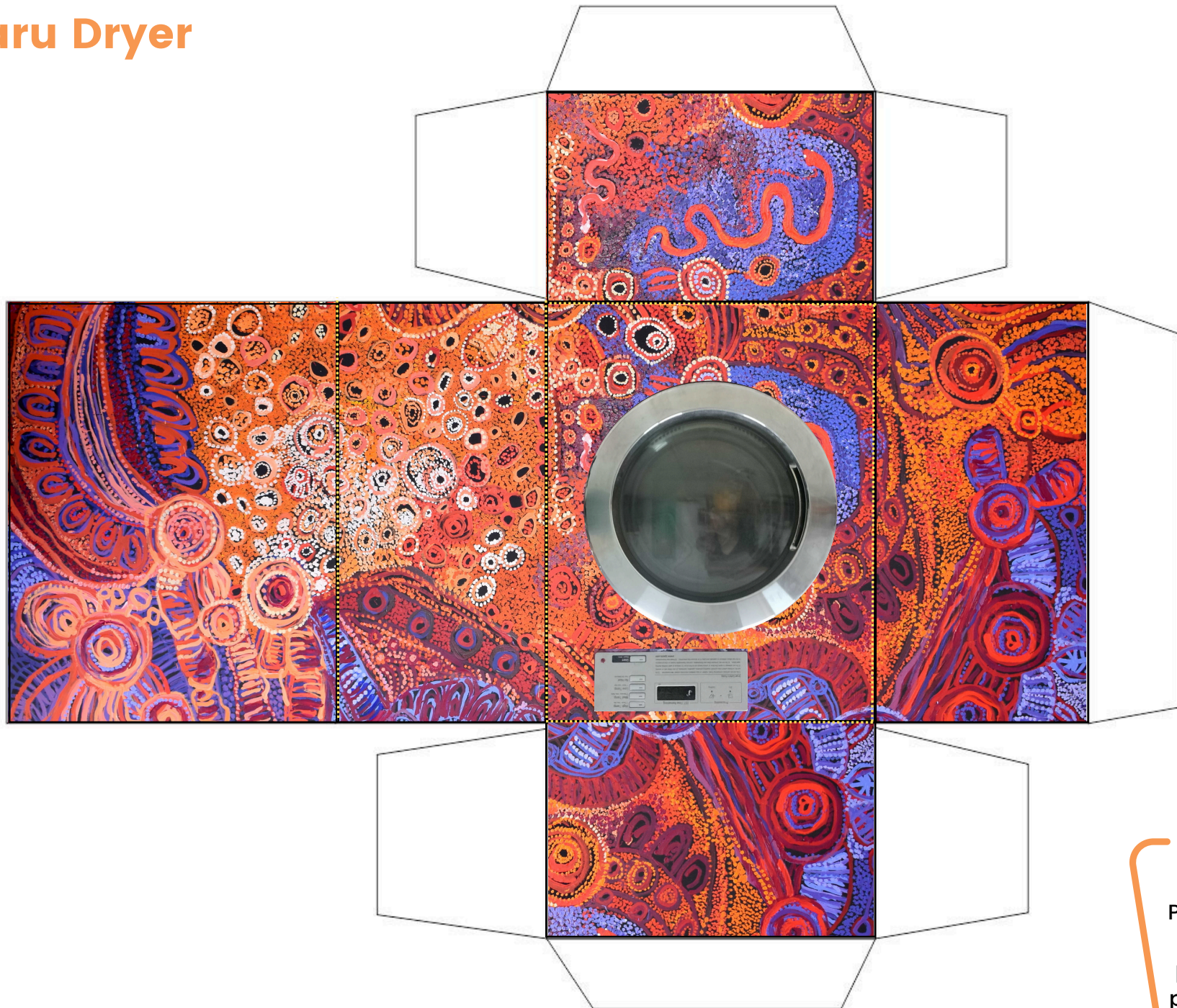
DID YOU KNOW?
